On Sat. Jan. 3, please check-in on the State HF Health Comm Net. They meet monthly on the First Sat. at 9:00 AM. Please start on, alternate frequency 3.888 MHz, then go to primary frequency 7.088 MHz and finally try 5,371.5 KHz on 60meters. Thanks Jack, KH6DQ

The changeover from analog to digital TV will happen first in the state of Hawaii on January 15th with the rest of the country to follow shortly. The FCC would like to get some help for people still using analog over the air TV sets. The FCC Honolulu Agent, John Raymond, is contacting leaders in the Amateur Radio community and asking for their help. He and other agents will be trying to meet with several groups. The issue is how to instruct people to program and set up a converter box. The FCC hopes to assemble a technical base to provide hands-on assistance to those in need.

Public calls will be routed through local FCC DTV hot-lines, and then referred to participants in the immediate vicinity. The Oahu phone numbers for the DTV team are 808-541-2389 or 808-541-2390. You may also e-mail HawaiiDTVtransition@fcc.gov for further information.

There will be both an FCC Commercial and Amateur examination session on Saturday 17th January 2009. Pre-registration is required NLT 15th January 2009 @ 9 PM by phoning Lee @ (808) 247-0587 daily between 9 AM and 9 PM. At this pre-registration each applicant will be briefed as to what is expected. This is a W5YI exam team so the following fee increase may or may not be in effect.

In November the ARRL VEC has announced that beginning 1 January 2009; Amateur Licensing exam fees will increase by \$1.00 from \$14.00 to \$15.00 for each session. This is the first increase in fees in four years.

NEWS and VIEWS:

There are 2700 hams in Hawaii and about 3200 total in the Pacific Section.

Recently there have been discussions among section managers and ARRL staff on how to approach Frequency Coordination on VHF/UHF. Frequency Coordination is not an ARRL function nevertheless SM. Directors and staff are often looked to for answers in this area. ARRL suggested a band plan that is widely recognized and they published a repeater directory. In Hawaii there have been three frequency coordinators widely recognized. They were Jules Vetter, Pat Corrigan and now Rick Ching. The frequency coordinator received his authority from a vote of the major clubs who agree to follow his lead. Rick Ching, KH7O is recognized as a member of the National Frequency Coordinators' Council, Inc. NFCC. This coordinator has been certified by the NFCC and complies with the NFCC standards. An ARRL link at http://www.arrl.org/nfcc/ provides more information on NFCC. Rick has performed this job very well and is to be commended for his fine work. BIARC Radio Contest News

The contest news is compiled from your reports and using information gathered from the contesting.com web sites.

KH6LC had the high overall score in the **Stew Perry Warmup**. Now on to the real event the weekend after Christmas.

The big event last month was the **CQ Worldwide CW** contest. Conditions were only fair, with 10 meters almost nonexistent and 15 meters of limited use. **Bill KH7B** ran a single band 40 meter operation and made 2670 Qs in 39 zones and 126 countries for a score of 1311355 that put him close to the top of reported scores in this category. **Lloyd KH6LC** assisted by **N6KB**, **SM0DRD**, **KH7Y**, **W6NV**, **and AH6RE** put on a multi-operator 2 transmitter effort, making 5702 Qs, 148 zone multipliers, and 317 country multipliers for a score of 7815255, a little less than last year. The **KH6LC** crew would like to emphasize that contacts made via smoke signals from Lloyd's linear amplifier were not counted in the final claimed score.

The **ARRL 160** meter contest opened to fair conditions the first night that declined to poor the second night, at least in the Pacific and the western part of the US mainland. **KH6LC** was manned by **N6KB** and **AH6RE** using Curt's K3 radio, and Ken's Ten-Tec Titan amplifier was used in place of Lloyd's smoke-damaged amp. They eked out 559 Qs in 67 sections and 13 countries for 114880 points. The second night was particularly painful.

It takes a masochist to spend a lot of time on an affair like the **ARRL 10** meter contest with conditions like we have been having lately, but **Fred KH7Y** stepped up to the plate and made all of 95 Qs and 21 mults in the mixed high power category for a total score of 6300. If **Irene NH7PE** tried the contest in the low power category, she and Fred were not in direct competition and they may both get certificates this year.
